## **EMBLEM**







On an Air Force blue globe, its axis bendwise, gridlines Air Force golden yellow, an Air Force golden yellow equilateral triangle throughout, one point up; all surmounted by a brown arrow and green olive branch in saltire below three stylized white delta-winged aircraft, flying fesswiss in a "V" formation; outlines Air Force blue throughout. On a white scroll, edged and inscribed Air Force blue, PARANTES PARATI, To Prepare is to be Prepared. **SIGNIFICANCE**: The emblem in symbolic of the squadron and its mission. The three aircraft signify the squadron's ability to transport personnel, cargo and personal effects by air in support of the three services represented by the triangle on a worldwide basis indicated by the globe. The olive branch, superimposed war the arrow, symbolizes the ability of the squadron to support mercy and good will missions as well as combat missions of the armed forces. The emblem bears the Air Force colors, ultramarine blue and golden yellow. (Approved, 27 Oct 1961)

### **OPERATIONS**

President Lyndon B. Johnson mobilized Air Force Reserve airlift forces in January 1968 in response to the North Korean seizure of the USS Pueblo. On 13 May, to replace shortages in the Strategic Reserve, the Air Force mobilized three aerial port squadrons. The aerial port units involved were: 82d APS (Travis AFB, CA). 86th APS (McChord AFB, WA), and the 88th APS (McGuire AFB, NJ). The three aerial port squadrons were assimilated into Military Airlift Command aerial port operations at Travis, McChord, and McGuire, but members of the 88th APS deployed on temporary duty to the Republic of Korea in July to augment aerial port organizations.
